21st Century Skills

In November, the Massachusetts Board of Education released a white paper on 21st century skills. The report, *School Reform in the New Millennium: Preparing All Children for 21st Century Success*, was prepared by a task force including leaders from the state legislature, education sector, and business and technology industries. The task force developed a set of recommendations for integrating 21st century skills into the state's K-12 curriculum frameworks. According to the report, 21st century skills include thinking strategically and creatively, using technology to solve problems, working collaboratively, and communicating effectively. They also include financial and business literacy, global awareness, and innovation. Schools have the daunting task of preparing students for future jobs that currently do not exist. In a rapidly changing world, employers want workers who are well-versed in these 21st century skills.

Recently, President Obama praised the high standards of the Massachusetts curriculum frameworks and MCAS exams, saying they are a model for the entire country. Massachusetts students score at the top of the NAEP (National Assessment of Education Assessment) in relation to other states and the international TIMSS (Trends in Individual Math and Science Study) in relation to other countries. However the report reminds us that beyond the state's success in academic achievement, we need to begin to integrate 21st century skills in a systematic way. In the report, the Chair of the task force, Gerald Chertavian writes, "Despite our record of success, it is time to reinvent our schools from top to bottom to meet the economic and educational demands for the 21st century." In the February 24th Boston Globe, Chair of the Massachusetts Board of Education Maura Banta wrote, "Our role now as policy makers, educators, business leaders, and parents is to provide students with the best of both worlds: a strong and challenging academic curriculum, and a full infusion of the 21st century skills students will need to succeed outside of school."

As the high school, department directors and school administrators are reviewing the white paper and will examine what we currently do and where we may go in relation to 21st century skills. Stay tuned.

STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering Math) Talent Pipeline Initiative

The Massachusetts Department of Higher Education (DHE) oversees the STEM Talent Pipeline Initiative, a project to increase the number of students majoring in STEM related careers so that the country can meet the growing demand for science, technology, engineering, and math related employment. WHS has a STEM committee looking at the same issue and developing recommendations for guiding students into STEM related majors and careers. We are interested in the potential of WHS parents in STEM related jobs for providing career presentations and/or unpaid internships for students. MESSAGES FROM THE ASSISTANT PRINCIPALS

TARDINESS TO SCHOOL: A parent must excuse students who are tardy to school with a note or telephone call explaining the tardiness on the same day as the late arrival. Whether being excused by note or telephone call a late arriving student must report to the Main Office, where the student will scan their identification card and receive a pass to class. If a student misses a quiz or test, or fails to turn in a paper or project, due to an excused tardiness he/she must see the teacher the same day and take the test or quiz or turn in the paper or project after school that day or by arrangement with the teacher.

ACTIVITIES ATTENDANCE POLICY: To participate in a sport, extracurricular activity, or other school events such as dances, the student must attend all scheduled classes that are assigned on the day of the practice, game or event that is to be held. Chronic attendance problems may result in removal from a team or activity. Tardiness or dismissal will only be accepted under rare circumstances and must be cleared through the administration prior to the tardiness or dismissal. If the event is held on a weekend or a holiday, the above statements will hold true for the school day preceding the weekend or holiday.

MESSAGE FROM SRO ANTHONY RUSSO

Students should not park in the visitor parking spaces that are located in the front driveway of the school. Parking ticket violations have been issued and will continue to be issued. Students who do not park in the student designated areas and/or do not use good judgment in operating and parking their vehicles will be denied the privilege of bringing a vehicle onto school property.

NEXT YEAR'S SCHOOL CALENDAR

The School Committee has voted to begin the 2009/2010 school year for students on Tuesday September 1. Since Labor Day falls late this year (on September 7), an earlier start will allow the last day of school to fall earlier in June. This option was supported by a majority of parents responding to the School Department's survey. September 1 will be an early release day for all grades. September 2 will be an early release day for elementary students; September 3 will be a full day for all levels, and there will be no school on September 4 to allow families a long Labor Day weekend.

Making the Final Decision on College

For juniors, the college search is just beginning. However, for this year's Class of 2009, the question of where to attend college and how to make the final choice of which school to attend may yet remain unanswered. Here are some tips for seniors (and their parents) who may be trying to decide between two or more colleges:

- Review your original criteria to see why you originally chose to apply to each college. See if those criteria have changed over the course of your senior year.
- Consider how far from home you actually want to be. What seemed to be a good distance in September may seem too far away, now that going away to college is looming ever closer.
- Compare offers of financial aid to determine which college is more affordable and whether the family's finances have changed during the year. This might have to be the deciding factor.
- If you truly cannot decide between colleges, revisit them, attend freshman survey courses in your field of interest, eat all of your meals in the dining hall, and hang out in the student union to see if you would feel at home there.
- If you are interested in sports, meet with the coach of your sport and talk to players.

In the end, if all other factors seem comparable, seniors need to trust their instincts. Students and parents need to know that there is no one "perfect college". Every college will have advantages and drawbacks. It is important to make that final decision and then make the most of a wonderful opportunity!

American Legion Student Trooper Training Summer Program

The American Legion, in cooperation with the Massachusetts State Police, sponsors the Student Trooper Program. The program consisting of a one-week, live-in class at The Massachusetts State Police Recruit Training Academy in New Braintree, MA, is intended to provide male and female high school students, 15–17 years old, the opportunity to consider law enforcement as a potential career choice. Two classes are scheduled: July 13 -17, 2009; and July 27 – July 31, 2009. Each class will be an extensive law enforcement career-training program patterned after the State Police Recruit Training. The program is not intended to be a summer camp and is not designed for troubled teenagers. Discipline is strict with vigorous physical training, reveille at 5:30 a.m. and “lights out” at 10:00 p.m. Students attend classes each day on topics such as motor vehicle law and investigative techniques. Applications may be obtained from any American Legion or high school and must be authorized by an American Legion Post. Deadline for applications is May, 15, 2009. Sponsorship fee is \$250.00. 2009 STEM Discovery Program At Wentworth Institute of Technology

The STEM Discovery Program is a 3-week program at Wentworth Institute of Technology offering a course of study in the science and engineering fields to Boston-area high school juniors and seniors. Through a combination of class work, laboratory experiments, and exposure to working professionals, students will have an opportunity to explore their interests in a variety of scientific and technical fields. Parenting Book Group

Please join us for the final meeting of this school year of the Parent to Parent and Winchester Public Library book group, on **April 30 at 7:30 p.m.** in the meeting room of the Library. We are looking forward to discussing *Nineteen Minutes*, a novel by best-selling author Jodi Picoult. This page-turner about a school shooting was chosen for the final book group meeting because of the profound parenting issues raised throughout. Some of the topics we expect to discuss include: how do we really get to know our children; how can we be resources for them when they struggle with life's challenges; how do we deal with the inevitable ways in which our children do not fulfill our expectations and/or dreams; and how do we create a caring community of children and adults that is different from the one Picoult portrays.
