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**From the Office of Principal Tom Gwin**

The year continues to fly by as we glide into Spring Training, March Madness, and a very busy month at Winchester High School. March features the course registration process that will kick off during the week of March 2nd. From March 5<sup>th</sup> through 11<sup>th</sup>, guidance counselors will visit social studies classes to give out the *2008-09 Student Guide and Course of Studies* and discuss the registration calendar, graduation requirements, new courses, and other important registration-related information. The *2008-09 Student Guide and Course of Studies* will also be available on the WHS website, listed on the home page under "course selection".

Faculty will be making course recommendations for students during the week of March 9<sup>th</sup>. Teachers will make recommendations based on the current course level and student performance during the year. Please consider teacher recommendations very seriously as the staff chooses the courses that will both challenge your children and provide them the best opportunity for academic success. However, if the parent/guardian(s) and student disagree with the teacher recommendation, there is an appeal process. Course appeal forms will be available on the high school website, and should be submitted to the appropriate director or coordinator by Friday, March 20<sup>th</sup>.

Parents will be notified of appeal decisions by April 17. There will be a special evening for parents of incoming 8<sup>th</sup> graders on Monday, March 2 at 7 pm in the WHS auditorium. The evening includes a presentation from the directors and coordinators on ninth grade course options as well as a Parent-to-Parent program featuring current WHS students and parents.

March also brings the first round of MCAS testing for 10<sup>th</sup> graders. English Language Arts testing will take place on the mornings of March 31, April 1, and April 2. WHS no longer has delayed openings during MCAS exams and all students should be in school at 7:45 am. Later in the year, 10<sup>th</sup> graders will also take the MCAS mathematics, 9<sup>th</sup> graders will complete a biology MCAS, and 11<sup>th</sup> graders will take a United States History MCAS.

I hope you are able to attend our musical, Sweet Charity, taking place on the nights of Thursday, Friday and Saturday, March 5, 6, and 7 at 7:30 pm in the auditorium. Please come and support our young performers.

Prescription Drug Abuse

According to many research studies, prescription drug abuse has been on a steady increase, especially among teenagers. The danger of prescription drugs is twofold. First, teenagers see these drugs as safer than illicit drugs because they are manufactured by pharmaceutical companies and are prescribed by doctors. Second, they are easily assessable from home medicine cabinets or from students to whom these medications have been prescribed. The drugs most commonly abused are pain killers (oxycontin, vicodin, and codeine), depressants (valium and xanax), and stimulants (often used to treat ADHD- ritalin and adderall). Parents can take three important actions to prevent children from misusing prescription drugs:

- Educate yourself about the medications being abused.
- Talk to your kids about the issue. Be very clear and explicitly state (frequently) your expectations of their behavior in regards to drugs.
- Lock up medications that you have at home and properly dispose of medications no longer in use.

I am working with the Winchester Substance Abuse Coalition in planning presentations to students regarding the misuse of prescription drugs.

## MESSAGE FROM NURSE BRITT

Student Illness and Medications ~ Except in an emergency a student who becomes ill at school should obtain a pass from a teacher before going to the Health Office. When a student is too ill to remain in school, a parent or the person designated on the contact sheet will be notified. Students must report to the nurse in cases requiring dismissal for health reasons. If they fail to do so, the absence will be considered a cut.

Students are not permitted to carry prescription or over the counter medications in school. This is mandated by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. All medications must be registered with the school nurse.

Any student who is returning to school following a contagious disease, extended illness or hospitalization must be readmitted to school by the school nurse. Any student returning to school with a cast, crutches, braces, etc., must be readmitted to school by the school nurse.

Students who need to be excused from active participation in physical education class for a medical reason must provide the nurse with documentation from a physician in order to obtain a PE excuse. Academic participation will still be required.

Students, with a doctor's note or a parent note stating that they cannot use the stairs because of an accident, injury, etc., may obtain an elevator key at the Nurse's Office with a \$10.00 deposit. A lost or non- returned key will result in an additional charge of \$10.00 dollars.

Students who are injured during school hours must report to the school nurse and file an accident report if necessary. If an injury occurs during an after school activity, it should be reported immediately to the advisor, trainer or coach.

## TECHNOLOGY ADVANCES AT WINCHESTER HIGH SCHOOL

We may not have a laptop per student at Winchester High School yet, but we are certainly moving forward with our technology every year.

Shortly after school started, we had a system-wide, Professional Development Day dedicated to introducing new technologies and improving learning. The world-renowned keynote speaker, Mr. Alan November, inspired us to envision new ways to teach. All teachers attended interesting and informative workshops of their choice after his provocative presentation.

As the Instructional Technology Specialist, I have the opportunity to facilitate the integration of technology in the curriculum. It is common to see teachers in every department using 21<sup>st</sup> Century tools to enhance the performance of students and achieve higher goals at Winchester High School. For example, one can find students in the departments of English, Social Studies, Foreign Language, or Health and Wellness using "blogs". They can critique or comment on their peers work. Sometimes they use Google Docs or Google presentations to show their products. Students learn to cooperate and collaborate to complete a project or an assignment. Teachers find these tools user friendly, as they can easily access student work at their convenience, give continuous feedback, and make assessments in a timely manner.

Teachers and students at Winchester High School use other 21<sup>st</sup> Century tools such as podcasts, wikis, films, virtual tours, and Skype for communication. We are looking forward to video conferencing with students in other parts of the world. Some teachers use [skrb1.com](http://skrb1.com) as an interactive whiteboard tool in class, or they use [Quizlet.com](http://Quizlet.com) to prepare flash cards or to teach new vocabulary words. Certain textbooks are complemented by websites which extend learning into different venues.

We also have a new on line grading program this year, [www.Edline.net](http://www.Edline.net), which is a resource to help parents monitor their children's academic progress. Several of our teachers post student grades on Edline.net, and all use this site for reporting grades each quarter.

I am looking forward to expanding the use of these exciting new tools with more teachers and students in the coming months to further empower teaching and learning at Winchester High School.

#### 2008-2009 Winchester Scholarship Foundation Application Available

The Winchester Scholarship Foundation (WSF) annually awards grants to students residing in Winchester who need financial assistance in order to attend a post-secondary institution. The WSF will award aid even if a student is receiving scholarships from several other sources, as long as it appears that there is a gap between what the parent can fairly be expected to contribute and the yearly costs of the school or college the student will be attending. WSF scholarships are often used to reduce inordinate amounts of loan or campus work. WHS seniors who are graduating in June are eligible to apply for WSF aid. The new 2009-2010 applications are now available in the Guidance Office. Deadline for submission of the WSF application with required tax documents is May 5, 2009. The WSF maintains a policy of strict confidentiality in regard to all information submitted by applicants.

#### How to Spot a Scholarship Scam

A recent article on collegeboard.com highlighted tell-tale signs that a scholarship service is a scam. According to the College Board, "...nearly all available financial aid comes from the federal government or from individual colleges." In Winchester, a significant source of assistance is provided by the WSF (see above) and there are often private scholarships for very specific applicants with particular career interests, or memberships in certain churches or other social organizations. Collegeboard.com lists the following lines as a sign that you may be getting duped:

- The scholarship is guaranteed or your money back.
- You can't get this information anywhere else.
- I just need your credit card or bank account number to hold this scholarship.
- We'll do all the work.
- The scholarship will cost money.
- "You've been selected by a national foundation" to receive a scholarship or "You're a finalist" in a contest you never entered.

Scholarship Scams from FinAid.org provides advice on how to identify scams, how to distinguish between legitimate and fraudulent organizations, how to protect yourself from scholarship scams, and what to do if you are scammed. The basic rule to follow—"Free money shouldn't cost a thing."

#### Colleges of the Fenway

The Colleges of the Fenway (COF) gives students the benefits of a university—access to a wider range of social and academic experiences and opportunities—while maintaining the personal touch of a small college. COF is a consortium that brings together the resources of six colleges in Boston's famed Fenway Cultural District, to offer more classes, more clubs (225 clubs on the six campuses), and more social activities, just by attending one of the six COF colleges: Emmanuel College, Massachusetts College of Art, Massachusetts College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences, Simmons College, Wentworth Institute of Technology, and Wheelock College. COF's joint initiatives, including cross registration and student programs, aim to improve the quality of education and enrich student experiences while ensuring each college maintains its individual identity. Together, COF represents more than 11,000 undergraduate students—16 percent of the total Boston population of undergraduates attending four-year colleges, and more than 2500 course offerings. #### Advice to students who will be attending a Spring College Fair

College Fairs can be crowded thus it is not easy to obtain a one on one meeting of substance with at this type of meeting. Suggestion: students design a brief profile and leave it at the table of the college one wishes to receive either information or a personal contact. The profile can be a card with the students name, address, telephone number, email address – the name of the high school the student is attending with a graduation date -- in one word descriptions of areas of interest -- that the student would like to meet personally with the college representative should that person be in the area. If the student can visit the college during the summer, this might be the time in which to request an interview during a summer visit. Should a parent accompany a student to a College Fair? Suggestion: the student and parent divide the table hopping task and each deliver profile cards. While delivering profile cards pick up the college representatives card for future reference. It is helpful to have a specific name ( reference) when requesting information/ interview.
